

Understanding Democracy Through Elections – Year 7- 9

Curriculum Alignment

Learning Intentions

Students will:

- Explain why elections are essential in a democracy.
- Understand how South Australia’s electoral system works.
- Analyse the roles and responsibilities of elected representatives.
- Reflect on their role as future participants in democracy.

Session 1: Why Elections Matter

- **Key Concepts:** Representative democracy, fairness, political equality.
- **Activities:**
 - Starter question: “*Could a democracy exist without elections? Why or why not?*”
 - Overview of democratic principles and how elections uphold them.
 - Connect to SA election as a real-world example.
- **Student Task:**
 - Write a short explanation: *How do elections protect democratic values?*

Session 2: How Elections Work in South Australia

- **Key Concepts:** Secret ballot, compulsory voting, preferential voting.
- **Activities:**
 - Review the 2022 SA election timeline. [See 2022 State election report page 6](#)
 - Discuss why Australia uses compulsory voting and its impact on fairness.



- **Student Task:**
 - Create an annotated diagram of the voting process.
 - Extension: Evaluate one strength and one challenge of compulsory voting.

Session 3: Political Participation and Campaigning

- **Key Concepts:** Political parties, candidates, ethical campaigning.
- **Activities:**
 - Analyse generic campaign strategies (posters, slogans, media influence).
 - Discuss: “*What responsibilities do candidates have during elections?*”
- **Student Task:**
 - Develop a **code of ethical campaigning** (focus on respect, truth, inclusivity).

Session 4: After the Election – Power and Accountability

- **Key Concepts:** Formation of government, accountability, representation.
- **Activities:**
 - Explain how votes translate into governing authority. [2022 State election results](#)
 - Discuss the role of the Premier, Cabinet, and Parliament.
- **Student Task:**
 - Write an explanatory paragraph: *How are elected representatives accountable to voters?*

Session 5: Youth Voice and Future Participation

- **Key Concepts:** Civic agency, active citizenship, political literacy.
- **Assessment Task (Summative):** Choose ONE:
 - Analytical response: *To what extent do elections ensure representative government?*
 - Civic action proposal: *How young people can engage ethically in democracy.*
 - Multimedia presentation: *Why elections still matter in modern Australia.*

Success Criteria:

- Uses accurate civics terminology.
- Demonstrates understanding of electoral processes.
- Presents a reasoned, evidence-based argument.
